**66** Mr *Fairs* to move—That the House:—

(1) Notes:—

- (a) the conflict in the Middle East is causing concern for Tasmanians regarding availability and cost of fuel;
- (b) the Tasmanian Government is engaging on a daily basis with the Federal Government on this issue;
- (c) the Federal Government's responsibilities regarding Australia's fuel supply, fuel prices surveillance, international obligations for liquid fuel reserves, and decisions on the rate of excise and goods and services tax on retail fuel sales;
- (d) Tasmania's Director of Energy Planning is advising Tasmanian fuel supply levels are robust and shipments continue to arrive as expected;
- (e) the following actions taken by the Tasmanian Government:
  - (i) the Premier and Deputy Premier hosting industry briefings;
  - (ii) the Deputy Premier has written to the ACCC calling for monitoring for fuel price gouging and anticompetitive behaviour;
  - (iii) working directly with the Federal Government to approve an expedited process for strengthening ACCC powers and penalties; and
  - (iv) the Deputy Premier has written to the Federal Energy Minister in relation to Australia's fuel supply.
- (f) the Premier has written to Tasmania's Director of Energy Planning to provide ongoing visibility of fuel stock levels across the state, including trends, constraints, and emerging risks, to support forward planning and ensure the state is positioned to respond to potential supply disruptions; and
- (g) the Tasmanian Government funds the Fuel Check app to enable Tasmanians to monitor fuel prices and find the cheapest fuel in their area.

(2) Supports ongoing engagement with the Federal Government to ensure continuing fuel security for Australia. (19 March 2026)

**67** Professor *Razay* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the high rates of chronic health disorders in Tasmania.
- (2) Recognises that the risk factors contributing are multiple and varied including, but not limited to:—
  - (a) an ageing population;
  - (b) changes in lifestyles, including a lack of physical activity and poor diet choices;
  - (c) pressures from the rising cost of living; and
  - (d) a lack of access to intervention services and education.
- (3) Notes that solutions to reduce chronic health disorders will require a collaborative approach between all three levels of government.

- (4) Calls on the State Government to work with the Federal Government, local municipalities, and private and voluntary organisations to prioritise prevention strategies and recognise that many chronic health conditions are preventable through early intervention and healthy lifestyle changes. (24 March 2026)

**68** Mr *Winter* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the draft determination of the Tasmanian Economic Regulator on TasWater’s Price and Service Plan 5 (PSP5).
- (2) Expresses grave concern at TasWater’s proposal to increase household water and sewerage prices by more than 40 per cent.
- (3) Further notes these increases would leave a family of four paying \$798 more each year by the end of the pricing period, worsening the cost of living pressures facing Tasmanians.
- (4) Condemns TasWater’s attempt to add \$365.1 million in decommissioned, retired, or replaced assets to its regulated asset base, effectively seeking to charge customers for infrastructure that no longer exists.
- (5) Questions TasWater’s claims of financial strain and being at a “critical juncture” while it simultaneously proposes a 50 per cent increase in dividends to owner councils, and the voluntary repayment of past COVID-19 era dividends.
- (6) Calls on the Government to:—
  - (a) withdraw its support for the Corporate Plan that underpins these excessive price rises;
  - (b) refuse to support any future Corporate Plan that includes the proposed 50 per cent increased dividends to councils; and
  - (c) request TasWater overhauls its community engagement approach so it accurately reflects the community’s concerns about cost-of-living pressure. (24 March 2026)

**69** Mr *Bayley* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Understands that following 12 years of mismanagement by the Liberals, Tasmania’s budget is in a dire position.
- (2) Notes:—
  - (a) the state’s credit rating has recently been downgraded by Moody’s and S&P; and
  - (b) the International Monetary Fund has also cited concerns about the Tasmanian budget, including raising the prospect of external intervention.
- (3) Recognises that for many years the Liberal Government has refused to listen to advice from Treasury and independent economists about the worrying trajectory of the state’s finances and has instead continued with policy decisions that make things worse.
- (4) Accepts that in its 2026 Fiscal Sustainability Report, Treasury has sounded its loudest alarm yet, warning of unprecedented levels of debt and the possibility of a bailout.
- (5) Notes with deep concern that the Treasurer’s response to the Fiscal Sustainability Report has been characterised by dismissal and denial.
- (6) Further understands that Tasmania’s budget position is critical for the economy, community, business, environment, and in supporting the essential services that all Tasmanians rely on.
- (7) Acknowledges that while there are different views on specific measures to address the budget crisis, there is no doubt that the Government’s stated approach is recklessly inadequate.
- (8) Agrees with Treasury and economists that increased revenue is an essential component of responding to the budget crisis and getting the state back on track.
- (9) Calls on the Government to heed expert advice and to finally accept the need to increase revenue in the upcoming State Budget. (24 March 2026)

**70** Ms *Rosol* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that inflation, lack of affordable housing and other cost of living pressures have resulted in many Tasmanians struggling to afford essentials and needing support from community service organisations.
- (2) Agrees that community service organisations provide essential services to Tasmanians, including emergency relief, mental health, youth wellbeing, child safety and family support, and housing and homelessness services.

- (3) Recognises with deep concern that chronic underfunding, growing demand, rising costs and workforce burnout are impairing community service organisations' ability to support Tasmanians in need.
- (4) Acknowledges that global events are leading to increased fuel prices and worsening cost-of-living pressures, resulting in Tasmanian families experiencing growing financial stress and needing more assistance from community service organisations.
- (5) Calls on the Rockliff Government to increase funding to community service organisations to match the level of need experienced by Tasmanians, including an immediate emergency uplift in funding to allow community service organisations to respond to current increased demands. (24 March 2026)

**71** Mr *Garland* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
  - (a) that many Tasmanians have significant concerns regarding Project Marinus;
  - (b) the growing and widespread public opposition across Tasmania, regarding proposed transmission and wind farm projects; and
  - (c) the inconsistent treatment of community members by both private and public energy infrastructure developers, over the past decade.
- (2) Recognises the need for the State Government to establish stronger and consistent standards for genuine community engagement and consultation by all public and private developers, regarding their energy infrastructure projects.
- (3) Acknowledges the community's expectation for Tasmania to adopt a binding Code of Conduct for Electricity Infrastructure and Renewable Developers, which must:—
  - (a) demonstrate good faith engagement;
  - (b) provide clear evidence of dispute resolution;
  - (c) uphold transparency throughout the project lifecycle;
  - (d) protect local environmental and cultural values;
  - (e) protect prime agricultural land; and
  - (f) have provisions for suspending, refusing, or withdrawing planning approval for renewable energy and transmission projects that fail to uphold the standards set by the Code.
- (4) Calls on the Minister for Energy and Renewables to develop a Code of Conduct for Electricity Infrastructure and Renewable Developers, including a four-week public consultation period, and implement this Code of Conduct in relevant legislation and regulation no later than 18 June 2026. (24 March 2026)
