STATEMENT BY PRESIDENT

Treasurer's Budget Speech - Procedure for Attendance

Mr PRESIDENT - Honourable members, before I call on Question Time, which will be a little shorter today, for members wishing to attend the budget speech in the other place, we assemble outside the Long Room, House of Assembly landing, at 2.55 p.m. The attendants from the House will assist us. After the Assembly resumes and the Budget is introduced, the Sergeant of Arms will allow us entrance to the Chamber and provide direction. Then we will withdraw after the speech has been delivered. For members not wishing to be seated on the Floor of the House of Assembly, the Speaker's Reserve can be used and accessed at any time. As is the usual practice, the budget paper packages, which includes the speech, will be placed on your seat here in the Chamber by our attendants as soon as the Treasurer commences his speech in the Assembly Chamber.

QUESTIONS

Fuel Provisions for the Civil Construction Industry

Ms LOVELL question to MINISTER for INFRASTRUCTURE and TRANSPORT, Mr VINCENT

The civil construction industry employs thousands of Tasmanians and is responsible for working with government to deliver important infrastructure projects across our communities. Currently, the increases in fuel prices are putting incredible financial pressure on many small to medium civil construction businesses across the state.

Will the government consider the request put forward by the civil construction industry to introduce rise and fall provisions for the fuel component in current government contracts to account for cost pressures and to ensure government projects are not delayed or put at risk?

ANSWER

Mr President, I thank the member for the question. A lot of dialogue is taking place on this at the moment, right around Australia. Some councils, because of the nature of their works, have offered small increases to some of the councils. It's been quite informative dealing directly with quite a few of the contractors in the Civil Construction Federation (CCF) on how they have managed their fuel situation at the moment and the percentage of the fuel usage within their contracts. It is a learning curve, when you strike these things of course, which is always good to learn from.

I'm not sure exactly, on a week-to-week basis, or a decision D-Day, but it is being worked through very seriously with the CCF and others. We are discussing it with and looking at other states. We have also had quite a few small- and medium-size councils contact the department to make sure that when a decision is made at the appropriate level that it is made so that it is fair and equitable across all their contracts and understanding of present contracts. Most of the contractors, at the moment, seem comfortable with the contingency they have in their road contracts to cover immediately. But they're anxious to make sure that, if it keeps escalating, or if it goes longer, that we will be in a position to be able to trickle the right policy into place that will cover that. I don't have a date for when that decision will be made, but I can assure you that there is a lot of discussion going on to understand exactly where they need to be because it's such an important part of our road and civil construction network. Thank you for the question.

Liberty Bell Bay Manganese Smelter

Ms WEBB question to LEADER for the GOVERNMENT in the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, Ms RATTRAY

This question is perhaps a little out of date now. The Liberty Bell Bay manganese smelter in George Town is in voluntary administration and there are reports that 175 jobs will be lost unless workers agree to take unpaid leave from 24 April this year. Can the government please:

- (1) detail whether the government has explored the option of providing repayable financial loans to the administrator for the purpose of securing the current workforce for the duration of future sale and wrap-up processes?
- (2) if so, provide any modelling undertaken detailing financial amounts required to maintain the workforce over specified timeframes, such as six or 12 months or some other period until either the smelter's purchase or ultimate permanent closure?
- (3) disclose whether any negotiations occurred with either Liberty Bell Bay, or its administrators, Ernst & Young, canvassing the option of repayable loans for the purpose of securing the workforce from this particular shutdown, until the administrator's determination that either a viable sale is to be finalised or the smelter is to be closed permanently;
- (4) whether the state has requested the federal government to explore provision of a repayable financial loan to the administrator, either of its own accord, or in joint arrangement with the state, noting it is no longer particularly relevant, but we might as well get it on the record.

ANSWER

- (1) On 23 April 2026, the Tasmanian and Australian governments jointly announced a \$3 million loan for the purpose of meeting employee wage obligations, while the administrators conduct an accelerated sales process.

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- (2) The cost of meeting wages and associated statutory on-costs, including superannuation contributions and applicable payroll tax obligations, for the full Liberty Bell Bay workforce is approximately \$1.6 million per fortnight.
- (3) The Tasmanian government is working closely with the administrators Ernst & Young (EY). The \$3 million in wage support funding has been provided to Liberty Bell Bay Pty Ltd (administrators appointed, receivers and managers appointed), in the form of a loan.
- (4) The Tasmanian government has partnered with the Australian Government to provide a time-limited loan to Liberty Bell Bay on a 50:50 basis for the purpose of meeting employee wage obligations during the Ernst & Young's sales campaign.
