1 COUNCIL MEETS.— The Council met at 11.00 o'clock a.m.

2 ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF TRADITIONAL PEOPLE.— The President said:

“We meet today on Tasmanian Aboriginal land. We acknowledge and pay respect to the Tasmanian Aboriginal people and elders, past and present. We recognise them as the first inhabitants and the continuing custodians of this land.”

3 PRAYERS AND REFLECTION.— The President read Prayers.

4 LEAVE TO TABLE ANSWER TO QUESTION AND INCORPORATE ANSWER INTO HANSARD.— *Ordered*, That Ms *Ratray* have leave to Table answer to Question No. 62 and have the answer incorporated into the Hansard record.

5 PALANTIR TECHNOLOGIES.— Ms *O'Connor* asked the Honourable the Leader of the Government —

- (1) During Budget Estimates in Government Administration Committee A this year, the Minister for Health was asked whether the Tasmanian Health Service has awarded any tenders, or signed any contracts, with any company or subsidiary of the global corporation, Palantir Technologies Inc. The question was taken on notice and the subsequent answer indicated there are no such tenders awarded or contracts with any Palantir Technologies Inc subsidiary company. Was a thorough search of current providers with THS undertaken to ensure an accurate answer is provided to the Council? Is the Minister certain the question asked by the Member for Hobart was responded to with the necessary due diligence and that the answer provided to GAA is correct?
- (2) Across State Service agencies, have any tenders been awarded or contracts signed with subsidiaries of Palantir Technologies Inc? If so, in which Agency or Agencies and for what services; to what financial value; and duration of the contract.
- (3) Does Palantir Technologies Inc, or any subsidiary of the corporation, have access to the personal data of Tasmanians that is stored or cached by State Service Agencies?

- (2) I am further advised that an examination of contractors identified in the Department of Health's recent annual reports, contractors awarded on tenders.tas.gov.au, and a review of creditors within the Accounts Payable Finance system identifies that the Department holds no contracts, partnerships or advisory arrangements with any Palantir Technologies Inc. subsidiary companies as identified above.
- (3) All Tasmanian State Service departments have confirmed that they have not awarded contracts to Palantir Technologies or its subsidiaries.

11 CONDOLENCE MOTION: PEOPLE OF NEPAL AND NEPALESE TASMANIANS.— *Resolved, Nemine Contradicente*, That the Legislative Council:—

- (1) Notes that hundreds of people have been killed and remain missing and there is extensive destruction following devastating flash floods that struck communities in the border region between Nepal and Tibet.
- (2) Expresses profound sadness at the tragic loss of life and suffering experienced in Nepal and extends its deepest condolences to all those affected.
- (3) Recognises the ongoing search and rescue efforts to locate those still unaccounted for, including reports that at least 43 Australians are among the missing.
- (4) Notes that Tasmania is home to a vibrant and growing Nepalese community, with more than 6,000 Tasmanians born in Nepal and more than 7,000 speaking Nepali at home.
- (5) Acknowledges the significant contribution of Nepalese Tasmanians in all aspects of Tasmanian life including work, sport and community participation.
- (6) Recognises that many members of Tasmania's Nepalese community will be grieving for family, friends and loved ones affected by this tragedy and affirms that this is a time to stand with the Nepalese community here in Tasmania and across Australia.
- (7) Pays tribute to the emergency services personnel, volunteers and humanitarian organisations providing assistance to those affected and urges Tasmanians to support fundraising efforts if they can.
- (8) Offers, on behalf of the Council and people of Tasmania, its heartfelt condolences to the people of Nepal and all Nepalese Tasmanians impacted by this tragedy. (Ms Ratray)

A Debate arose thereupon.

And the Question being put,

It was resolved in the Affirmative.

12 APPROVAL OF PROCLAMATION UNDER NATURE CONSERVATION ACT 2002.— A Motion was made (Ms Ratray) and the Question was proposed, That the Legislative Council approves, for the purposes of section 18(2) of the *Nature Conservation Act 2002*, the draft Proclamation made under section 17(1) of the *Nature Conservation Act 2002*, laid upon the Table of the Council on 20 August 2026, for the alteration of the class of reserved land over an approximately 8.295 ha parcel within the approximately 67.3 ha Calverts Hill Nature Reserve from the class of Nature Reserve to

the class of Nature Recreation Area and give the name Calverts Hill Nature Recreation Area to that parcel of land.

A Debate arose thereupon.

Ordered, That Ms *Ratray*, have leave to Table:—

- (1) Correspondence dated 19 April 2013: request from Clarence City Council to Parks and Wildlife Service regarding Calverts Hill Nature Reserve
- (2) Map of proposed Calverts Hill Nature Reserve – Coastal Trail
- (3) Photograph of Calverts Hill Coastal Trail
- (4) Calverts Hill map showing the proposed coastal strip for reserve status alteration and the distance of that parcel from the inland vegetation community of *Eucalyptus Morrisbyi*.

And the Question being put,

It was resolved in the Affirmative.

13 BILL NO. 21.— The Order of the Day was read for the Second reading of the Taxation and Related Legislation (Miscellaneous Amendments) Bill 2026.

A Motion was made (Ms *Ratray*), and the Question was proposed, That the Bill be now read the Second time.

A Debate arose thereupon.

14 SITTING SUSPENDED.— It being 1.00 o'clock p.m. the Sitting of the Council was suspended.

The Council resumed the Sitting at 2.30 o'clock p.m.

15 QUESTION TIME.— The President called for Questions without Notice. There were nine Questions asked.

16 BILL NO. 21.— The Council resumed the Debate on the Question, That the Taxation and Related Legislation (Miscellaneous Amendments) Bill 2026 be now read the Second time.

And the Bill was, accordingly, read the Second time and committed to a Committee of the Whole Council.

And the President having left the Chair, the Council resolved itself into the said Committee.

A Motion was made (Ms *Rattray*), and the Question was proposed, That the Bill be now read the Second time.

A Debate arose thereupon.

18 SITTING SUSPENDED. — It being 4.00 o'clock p.m. the Sitting of the Council was suspended.

The Council resumed the Sitting at 4.30 o'clock p.m.
